Often we want to be able to see into the future.

We say, "How will next year be for me?

Where will I be five or ten years from now?"

There are no answers to these questions.

Mostly we have just enough light to see the next step: what we have to do in the coming hour or the following day.

The art of living is to enjoy what we can see and not complain about what remains in the dark.

When we are able to take the next step with the trust that we will have enough light for the step that follows, we can walk through life with joy and be surprised at how far we go.

Let's rejoice in the little light we carry and not ask for the great beam that would take all shadows away.







FROM THE Principal's Desk

Greetings to all our MCI Crossroads readers! This is my first epistle as the principal at MCI, and I look forward to getting to know all of you personally at some point in this journey. It has been such a privilege to meet all our diverse student body and wonderful Christian staff, but I seek to get to know you as our school community and family as well.

Our chosen theme for this school year is "BE BRAVE!" Our chapels are focusing on this point, as is our Christian Life Committee. We as Christians are encouraged by Christ and the writers of Scripture to "take heart" and "fear not" many times in the Bible. We are often encouraged "to stand," to "run to our Rock," or shelter in God's almighty arms. Paul loves to encourage us that we are the army of God, marching into a battle against the unseen adversaries of Satan. We must "put on the whole armor of God" so we can stand and BE BRAVE!

When I was a child in Congo, we twice were evacuated under extreme duress during the Independence warfare of the 1960s. I recall the first time that guerrilla warriors were marching through eastern and southern Congo, fighting government troops, destroying whole villages, and killing missionaries and others indiscriminately. Our first inkling that they were nearing our mission station was when six carloads of missionaries suddenly arrived. They were dusty and worn out from long hours on horrific roads, staying just ahead of the rebels, who had already overrun two of our mission stations. When the missionaries arrived, we hastily piled our families into three vehicles and joined the daunting journey to stay ahead of the rebels! The plan was to get out of Congo and into Angola if possible. Along the route was another large mission station. We made it safely there and they joined our caravan, now 12 strong! We careened down dusty roads, got stuck in deeply rutted sand, pushed each other out, and kept going. Finally, after two days we saw the lonely marker for the border. Cheers rang out and then we saw the dust cloud of the rebels just two kms behind us. We drove frantically for the border, and just crossed in ahead of the rebels! What a test of being brave in the very real presence of impending death! God had answered our prayers!

We all face times in our lives where we are called to step out and BE BRAVE. These circumstances look different for each one of us, yet God remains the same - a constant rock to turn to and rest upon. God bless each of you and have a wonderful brave school year!

During the last week of September, MCI students and staff (and three staff children) headed off to Red Rock Bible Camp in the Whiteshell for our annual Christian Life Retreat. There were 12 stations each with a different challenge we needed to complete to find Paul Peters, who had been "kidnapped." an arts and literature publication



Submissions including poetry, prose, photography, drawings and paintings are submitted and I, along with my co-editor-in-chief, Emily McDonald, review the art. The process of deciding what is accepted and what is declined for a particular volume is difficult, knowing full well that an individual is putting their work in our hands to be viewed for perhaps the very first time. Following the submission deadline, we design the layouts, export our final copy and send it off to be printed.

The celebration for the release of the publication, as well as for those who helped make it possible, is the next item on our list. This event aims to bring the artists that have been involved in the publication together, interactions and encouraging fosterina excitement within the group of artists and their supporters. Here we release and sell the volume, also taking a moment to thank everyone who made this project possible. We further showcase a variety of music at this event in hopes of furthering the careers of local musicians. Following this celebration, we start the process again, working to create the next volume of the publication.

This project has exceeded our expectations. Opening submissions to artists across Canada began a network of relationships all over the country. We have gained trust within the arts community, as artists have submitted their work to a small, unknown publication. Over 150 submissions were received for Volume 1 of Reverie Review. What began as a hope and a dream, has become a reality, one in which we feel supported. As artists and co-editors we know there is value in putting artwork into the hands of another to be critically reviewed. It is how we become better.

This project is not only for us, the co-editors/ artists who are excited to have initiated a new project. It is for the 16-year old girl who just made her big break, the transitioning woman who writes his truths in poetic format, the art school student who wants to be recognized in more than just a classroom, and the girl who's dream has always been to be a published author. This project is for all of them and all of us. It is about artists helping artists in Winnipeg and extending to the coasts of Canada, creating a network of people who want to share their work with a wider community.

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




