

SOUP & PIE & FALL CONCERT



Youth Orbit '24 marked another smashing success for MCI. This annual event, held in January, was enjoyed by over 120 youth from across Southern MB. YO is a 2-day conference for teens in Grade 8 through 12 and we were thrilled to reach dorm capacity once again! This cherished tradition at MCI demonstrated its purpose of providing a space where youth can deepen their faith, make new friendships, create moments of learning and growth, all while having wild fun on our campus.

A highlight for many was the powerful worship services led by Jenny Franz and the Bread We Break band. The impact of these sessions was evident and deeply moving. Students took time for prayer with those around them, sat in quiet spaces to pour out their hearts independently or simply watched and experienced the moment. The event served as a turning point for many beautiful God-moments. Main speaker Connor Gerbrandt, from Anchor Point Church in Winnipeg, delivered powerful messages that sparked beautiful reflection and a call for deeper faith. The chosen theme of “God Calling” created an environment of self reflection and bold teaching. Many of the youth shared that they felt a stirring of faith in new ways or were introduced to God’s calling on their lives personally. I heard it whispered, “Can you believe this is part of our school?” It was a beautiful experience.

The halls were not only physically full but also buzzing with a sense of community, joy, and fun for all participants. Various activities, including the wildly successful Mod Olympics and late-night volleyball in the gym, fostered a sense of unity among the youth. The environment encouraged open

conversations, laughter, and genuine friendships, leaving a lasting impact on the lives of those involved.

“We know that not all learning takes place in the classroom,” says interim principal Jennifer Klippenstein. “These workshops provide opportunities for students to learn new skills, give back to the community, and dive deeper into interests that they already have a passion for.”

Workshop Wednesdays was a great way for MCI students to connect with the wider community while learning new skills. Students in the set design workshop designed, built and took down sets for a local theatre company’s production in Buhler Hall. Students in the agriculture workshop visited local farms to learn from their different areas of expertise. The outdoor education group put their learning into practice, and after five weeks of trip planning, risk management, and skill development embarked on a student-planned hike in the Pembina Valley with a local adventure tour agency, *Wilderland Adventure Company*, owned and operated by MCI alumn Matt Peters.





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

FINANCIAL UPDATE CORNER

“And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity.”

– Colossians 3:14

The MCI Board of Directors continues to work toward the goals expressed in MCI’s 2023-2025 Strategic Plan: Renewed Hope for the Future (available on MCI’s website). We shared our progress at the Annual General Meeting in November and in our annual report to our Society churches. Here are a few recent highlights:

- **Finances:** The Donor Development Committee, which helped raise \$600,000 in donations and pledges over a four-month period in 2023, continues its work as we enter 2024. We are now halfway through our current fiscal year, and we are pleased to report that our expenses are lower compared to last year, currently tracking close to budgeted amounts. Our lower enrollment means reduced income from tuition and government grants, so we will again rely on our donor base for a significant portion of our revenue. Our current projection is that we will need approximately an additional \$300,000 from donors to meet expected expenses this fiscal year (ending June 30). Most people were eager to continue their support of the school with donations and/or pledges for future donations. This spirit of generosity was astonishing and humbling!
- **Enrollment:** With the help of many dedicated volunteers, MCI revived Youth Orbit in March 2023 and held a second Youth Orbit in January 2024. Both events attracted over 100 students. It is good to see renewed interest in the school generated from those events.
- **Educational excellence:** The Board convened a new volunteer Educational Advancement Committee to examine and enhance MCI’s education program. Check out their report in this issue of CrossRoads.
- **Stakeholder engagement:** With the help of the Parent Advisory Committee, MCI has held several community-oriented events that have successfully brought people onto campus. We have also heard calls to find new ways to re-engage with our churches.

Reaching out to stakeholders has led to many meaningful conversations. We have heard heartfelt concerns about MCI’s sustainability. We have also heard many stories about the school’s positive impacts. One donor shared how a current student was benefiting from the school’s Biblical teaching and caring community as follows: “If that is what is happening at the school now, I want to be a part of it and support the school!” A donation cheque soon followed.

Another conversation with someone who had not been in recent contact with the school resulted in a generous

years-long financial commitment. In another conversation, a grandmother and MCI alum, after observing her grandchild’s renewed involvement and growing leadership in the local church, expressed hope that the school would be there for many other children and grandchildren who need to be nurtured in a Christian school community.

Indeed, the church depends on the leadership from younger generations! Throughout its 135-year history, MCI has faced numerous financial, social, and theological challenges. MCI has consistently met those challenges and, in doing so, given leadership by helping to set positive new directions. As we pass through this current time of challenge, we ask for continued support from churches, alumni, and friends of the school. And let us “put on love” (Colossians 3:14) as we support MCI’s mission together.

Before closing, I want to announce that Jennifer Klippenstein, Interim Teaching Principal, and the MCI Board have decided that the time has come to search for a permanent full-time leader for MCI. On behalf of the Board, we express our deep gratitude to Jennifer for stepping into this interim role at a very difficult time. Since taking on the role in January 2023, she has demonstrated courage, a passion for the school and its students, and a prayerful and steadfast reliance on God’s faithfulness as she navigated many challenges. We are very pleased that Jennifer plans to stay at MCI, returning to the classroom where she can more fully utilize her teaching skills and connect directly with students. The Board has initiated the search process; we invite your prayers for wisdom and discernment.

EDUCATION COMMITTEE

New Educational Advancement Committee (EAC): Read all about it!

The 2023-2025 Renewed Hope for the Future Strategic Plan highlights the importance of educational excellence, building on MCI's performing arts strengths, and leveraging well-rounded educational experiences to equip students for the future.

With recent lower enrolment and staff turnover, challenges with sustaining a high-quality educational program have arisen. For example, during the 2023-2024 school year, some elective options were eliminated, and some courses were delivered through InformNet. Alongside these challenges, there is recognition that a smaller student body offers opportunities for building new programs tailored to specific learning needs.

On October 30th, 2023, the MCI Board approved terms of reference for the Education Advancement Committee (EAC), and the first meeting of the committee was called to order on November 27th, 2023. Since then, the committee has met on a monthly basis.

Members of the EAC include:

- Four volunteers, selected with input from the leadership team and/or the Board, with a demonstrated educational background and strong connections to MCI and its constituency (Barb Kehler, Karla Fehr, Jolene Friesen-Stoesz, and Chris Enns)
- At least one representative from MCI's leadership team (Kieran Reynolds, Jennifer Klippenstein)
- One Board liaison (vacant)

- The Board Chair (as ex officio) (Jonathan Regehr)

The EAC mandate includes reviewing MCI's existing educational program, and identifying new credit options, educational offerings, performing arts program enhancements, and unique learning opportunities for students.

The committee supports the mission and core values of MCI, which operates as a provincially accredited independent Anabaptist Christian high school. Informed by knowledge, experience, research, and provincial policies, the committee and MCI's Leadership Team work collaboratively, and report findings to the MCI Board.

Stay tuned for updates in the future. The Education Advancement Committee welcomes your prayers as it works to meet its objectives in support of MCI.



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DONOR DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

On April 18, 2023, the MCI Board of Directors formed a volunteer Donor Development Committee to support a fundraising drive launched alongside the Renewed Hope for the Future Strategic Plan.

The initial mandate of the Committee was to help raise \$500,000 to cover expenses in the 2022-23 fiscal year. By June 2023, the Committee had raised over \$600,000 in cash and future pledges. This accomplishment was critical in the Board's decision to keep MCI open.

In the summer of 2023, the Committee expressed a willingness to continue with its work, and on August 31, 2023, the MCI Board approved the Terms of Reference for the Donor Development Committee. The Committee provides reports to the Board through a liaison and interacts with the Director of Operations and Advancement.

The Committee connects with alumni, friends, supporters, and donors past and present in order to broaden MCI's donor base.

Currently, the Donor Development Committee is made up of six volunteers representing alumni, former staff, parents of former and current students, and a member of the board.

Members include; Sandra Wiebe (1996), David Dyck (1996), Dave Regehr (1966), Hildie Regehr (1967), Conley Kehler, Barb Kehler, and board member Wil Epp.






STUDENT ARTWORK
