





CLASS OF 1974

Ten months ago, I started the search to find classmates, as our last reunion had been 30 years ago and most of the addresses were now obsolete. After months of sleuthing, I began to communicate and ask fellow Stookies if they would like to reunite. There was a resounding "yes", and so plans began.

We met on a very hot and humid Sunday afternoon at our alma mater in Gretna on August 25, 2024. Thirty-four people had responded that they would be coming – 22 stookies out of a class of 32 grads registered their intent to attend. (Only one classmate was not located.) We were honoured to have classmates fly out from BC, Alberta and Ontario to join us. As we entered the room and looked at faces that seemed unfamiliar, we tried to match memories from the past. Name tags were handed out and there were hugs and smiles and lots of chatter.

We were graciously led on a school tour by Kieran, MCI's Director of Operations and Advancement. Stories began to pour out as we passed familiar spaces and then entered new additions that we could not have imagined 50 years ago. The dorms no longer have bunk beds nor windows that only opened a slight slit from the top section where we used to store frozen goods in the freezing days of winter. No more long rows of sinks and showers where we lined up to brush our teeth. And the

Ens) was writing the Mennonite History lesson on the blackboard with his back to us, and a few of the guys threw Bev out of the open classroom window? And those ceiling tiles that used to lead to the kitchen for midnight snack? And evidence found in an album regarding a Halloween party invitation to Room #4 at 3:30 AM?

After the tour, we gathered outdoors near the MCI sign in front of the school to take pictures. My favourite moment of the day was when we spontaneously broke into our graduation theme song "Climb Every Mountain" while we were being photographed. We may need a bit of practice, but it was a sweet sound that struck a chord in my heart.

We then moved back into the dining hall and we paid tribute to Eric Bueckert, our only classmate that has passed. This was followed by giving each stookie a couple of minutes to share a synopsis of their life since that graduation milestone. We shared laughter and tears at victories and heartaches and felt reunited once again as the Class of 1974! We had planned to have dinner in the Altona Park, but due to the heat and humidity, we stayed in the "new" dining hall. We gave thanks and shared salads, pizza and lovely desserts around tables and engaged in more conversation and memories. Faintly in the distance, 70's music was playing, but few people even noticed, as it was much more important to catch another tidbit from one more conversation.

Before long, we were sharing hugs of farewell and the reality of knowing this was a special time in a special place in our hearts! Some of us then headed back to the campground in Altona to extend the celebration around a campfire, as we hesitated to let the evening end!

FROM STOOKIE TO STAFF

For 135 years, Mennonite Collegiate Institute has offered young people an Anabaptist-centred education, a community to explore faith in, and a place to excel in music, academics and sport. The rich legacy of developing young peoples' God-given gifts in an Anabaptist-Christian setting continues to live on in the halls of MCI today.

For Roxanne Friesen (class of '86), an MCI alum and current MCI staff, MCI's mission is as relevant as ever. "Today's youth are searching, and I believe MCI has a unique and beautiful opportunity to lead these teens to scripture and share Christ's truth with them," she says. Friesen speaks from a place of experience – not only as a mother of four young people, but also as the school's receptionist and point person for student needs.

Friesen is one of four current staff members who were once MCI students, with over a dozen student-turned-staff at MCI in the last decade. Why do so many former students return to MCI after graduation? The answer is rooted in the love of a community whose deep traditions and meaningful relationships have left a permanent mark on them.

"I'm excited to still be a part of a school that was influential in my teens. Having Christ-centred teachers challenged me to grow in my personal faith and relationship with Jesus," Friesen shares. "While living in dorm at MCI I made some great friends, some of my closest friends to this day."

Friesen's positive experience as an MCI student led to her four children enrolling at the school, and she volunteered on the Parent Advisory Council and in the library before officially joining MCI staff in 2017. For Friesen, the students who fill the familiar hallways are the highlight for her.

"My absolute favourite thing about working here is my daily interactions with students! Whether it's celebrating last night's soccer goal or sharing their heart about a struggle or difficulty, it's such a privilege to laugh, encourage and pray with them," she says.

Friesen and the countless alumni who have "come home" to MCI connect MCI's past with its future, helping to create an environment that they thrived in and ensuring that the place that helped shape them is still shaping the next generation of young people.

"I'm just excited to be a part of this school and watch how God will use it for his glory."






Highlights of the Year

2024 Deficit: \$20,624 (an improvement from 2023's \$96,000 deficit)




Key Financial Goals for 2024/25
